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2016 ANNUAL MEETING

Message from Outgoing SRSRA Chair John Veldman

Over the past two years, I have been privileged to represent you as your SRS Retirees Association Chairman. I have been supported by a very talented and dedicated Board of Directors and have met many members. I am proud of what our team has accomplished through hard work and constructively working with the SRS contractors, DOE-SR, our elected representatives, and the Lower Savannah Council of Governments. The key accomplishments have been:

- 1. Health Plan Revisions Our post-65 health plan was revised to assist veterans, retirees with spousal coverage, those who had lost their stipend, and those living outside GA/SC. An important catastrophic drug cost "stop loss" feature was also added to the plan. SRNS, SRR, and DOE-SR deserve a lot of credit for their effective response to the issues that SRSRA raised. A review of the 2017 stipend amount will be conducted this year.
- 2. Resource Center Many of our retirees had a great deal of difficulty dealing with the post-65 insurance and reimbursement process. Seventeen months ago your Board took a giant leap of faith in establishing a Resource Center, in partnership with the Lower Savannah Council of Governments, to assist our retirees. To date, we have assisted over 1,000 people, enabling them to receive one million dollars in reimbursements and drug plan savings. Ms. Laureen Feinman, our Resource Center Manager, and over twenty volunteers worked very hard to make this happen. Please consider becoming a volunteer. SRSEA, SRNS, SRR, Bank of America, and the LSCOG have provided generous grant support to fund the Resource Center.
- 3. Pension Adjustment Proposal SRSRA developed a fiscally responsible "flat dollar value" pension adjustment proposal which would give the oldest retirees, with the smallest pensions, the highest percentage increases. Unfortunately, DOE-HQ would not support our proposal. This forces us to obtain the pension adjustment through legislation sponsored by our elected representatives in Washington, DC. Our delegation has been supportive of our proposal, and we are working with them to make it a reality.

Mr. Thomas French will assume the SRSRA Chair after the Annual Meeting. I have had the pleasure of working with Tom for many years, and I am confident that he will provide strong leadership as the Association develops new strategic initiatives and faces future challenges and opportunities. Please give him your enthusiastic support!

I would like to thank the Board of Directors, volunteers, partners, and our members for their support during the past two years. Helping our retirees has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life. God bless!

Draft Minutes of the April 2015 Annual Meeting

CALL TO ORDER

John Veldman, Chairman of the Board of Directors (BOD) Savannah River Site Retiree Association (SRSRA), welcomed the crowd of 374 registered members to the 2015 Annual Meeting on Tuesday, April 14, at 1:30 p.m.. He also welcomed representatives from the area's elected officials and the Department of Energy, namely, Rene Ann Brown (Senator Graham), Kelley Long (Senator Scott), Nancy Bobbitt (Senator Isakson), Jennifer Hayes (Senator Perdue), Sarah Beaulieu and Baker Elmore (Rep. Wilson), Jessica Hayes (Rep. Hice), Dr. David Moody (DOE) and Rick Sprague (SRNS).

STATE OF SRSRA

John began by saying the BOD had focused on three areas in the past year, which were to establish a Resource Center to assist retirees with health insurance, reimbursement, and other issues; achieve an ad hoc pension adjustment in 2015; and achieve improvements in the Post-65 Retiree Health Care Plan in 2016.

The justification for the pension adjustment includes:

- The earliest SRS retirees, or their surviving spouses, are the oldest, sickest, and have the smallest pensions
- These retirees have been the hardest hit by the changes in retiree medical benefits in 2013 substantial DOE savings come out of the pockets of retirees
- The SRS pension multiplier (1.2 percent x salary x yrs. service) is the lowest in the DOE Complex
- The average SRS pension is \$1,189/month
- Since the last pension adjustment in 2002, there has been more than a 30 percent loss in purchasing power, while pension payments have remained the same

• A modest pension adjustment acknowledges the continuing commitment to those who served the site and Nation

The proposal is a \$35 flat dollar value increase with an adder for time since retirement, for those retired prior to Jan. 1, 2009. This would amount to an increase of approximately \$35 to \$111/month (\$420 to \$1,332 per year), or 6.2 percent on average, for participants. The cost of this proposal is \$43 million amortized over 7 years to equal \$7 million annually. This results in the oldest retirees with the smallest pensions receiving the highest percentage increases. The proposed adjustment is less than a third of cost-of-living adjustments available to DOE employees and some other DOE sites (but not available at SRS). To pay for this proposal, the recently passed Congressional Transportation Bill reduced required SRS pension contributions by \$207 million over the next seven years, so the \$7 million per year during that period needed to fund the pension adjustment should not materially or adversely impact DOE programs or budget.

After two months of consultation with DOE-HQ officials, Dr. Moody announced in January that he would not recommend a similar SRSRA proposal due to budgetary priorities and concerns about future budgets. He did note that it might be possible to offer some assistance through the retiree health care plan. John said that the SRSRA board was working with the elected delegation to advance the current pension adjustment proposal.

A stipend-based health care system for retirees 65 and older was started on Jan. 1, 2013, with Savannah River Nuclear Solutions (SRNS) staff announcing that My Medicare Advocate would assist with sign-up and WageWorks would be the reimbursement agent. The initial sign-up process fell far short of expectations and the reimbursement process was difficult for many retirees. SRSRA BOD members worked with SRNS staff to resolve numerous issues and individual problems. The SRSRA Resource Center was established in September 2014 to assist retirees with insurance, reimbursement, and other issues.

DOE-SR and SRNS would be conducting a review of the 65+ retirees' health plan in 2015.

Several BOD members developed a white paper, "Lessons Learned from the SRS Post-65 Medical Stipend Program from the Retiree's Perspective," which was submitted to DOE-SR and SRNS in December 2014. The goal is for the white paper to be a catalyst for improvement opportunities during the review process. Review is under way, and SRSRA BOD members will receive interim updates on progress before decisions are made. This is not a negotiation since SRSRA members are beneficiaries and not a contractual party. The review is scheduled to be completed by August 2015, and changes will be implemented in 2016.

The white paper provides comparisons with other DOE sites and private industry, noting that **o**nly half of large employers provide retiree health benefits and 44 percent will stop administering these plans within two years. The paper highlights innovative approaches and emphasizes the need to compare all retiree benefits when making comparisons. After extensive research on retiree health care metrics, the white paper notes drugs are the largest factor in increases to health care costs. Medicare data shows a 12.1 percent total average annual drug cost increase, 2015 vs. 2014. The stipend is starting to fall behind covering the difference between current costs versus the pre-2013 plan, and an increase in the stipend is justified in 2016.

The white paper emphasizes the need for a prescription drug "stop-loss" provision. Before the 2013 plan, retirees had a stop-loss of \$2,000 per person or \$4,000 per family. Insurance industry data shows:

- Three percent of Part D enrollees reach catastrophic coverage (\$4,550 out-of-pocket expense)
- Retirees over 85 spend three times more out-of-pocket than retirees under 65 for drugs, and they have the lowest pensions
- It is therefore estimated that approximately 130 SRS retirees are spending an average of over \$10,000 per year out-of-pocket for drugs

- SRSRA has proposed a "stop loss" plan provision to limit SRS retiree out-of-pocket cost for drugs to \$4,550 per year
- The annual DOE cost for adding this provision would be approximately \$750,000 per year

The document noted that some current plan rules are having an adverse impact on some retirees, such as the following:

- Veterans with Veterans Administration or Tricare benefits must purchase a Medicare policy they do not need to receive their stipends
- Retirees who have access to health plans through their spouse must purchase a Medicare policy to receive their stipends
- Rule that if retirees lapse a Medicare Supplement or Advantage Plan, they lose their stipend permanently
- Rule that retirees must buy their Medicare Supplement or Advantage Plans through MMA, even when they are offered few choices

John Plodinec explained the Resource Center. This is a unique partnership between the Lower Savannah Council of Governments (LSCOG) and SRSRA with oversight by the Resource Center Committee. The SRSRA has received contributions from Savannah River Site Employees Association (SRSEA), SRNS and Savannah River Remediation (SRR). The center is located at 2748 Wagener Road, Aiken in the LSCOG building; staffed by a coordinator (Laureen Feinman) and 40 volunteers.

Since opening last September, Resource Center volunteers have helped over 500 SRS retirees make the most of their health care benefits. Examples include:

- Helping retirees solve over \$250K in reimbursement problems
- Providing information to help retirees choose the most suitable drug policy
- Having LSCOG help with other needed services (nutrition, transportation, caregiver assistance, etc.)

The center also offers a free "Introduction to Medicare" class for SRS retirees approaching age 65 on the second Tuesday of each month. John Plodinec encouraged retirees to call ahead (866-845-1550, option 7) to save a seat.

In closing, John asked for volunteers to staff the Resource Center to help the SRSRA members do more for SRS retirees. John Veldman reviewed the Treasurer's Report. Total income for the SRSRA, fiscal year 2015 to date has been \$49,445, mainly from membership dues and grants from SRSEA, SRNS, and SRR. Expenses for the same period have been \$50,346. Major expenses have been mailings of the newsletter, maintenance of the website, and expenses for the Resource Center.

John discussed the increase in membership dues. There has not been an increase since 1998. The reality is even with grants from SRSEA, SRNS and SRR, the costs for the Resource Center will be \$48,000, and the SRSRA will have a \$10,000 deficit. For fiscal year 2016 the projection is a \$7,000 deficit. The Resource Center is the reason for the deficits.

Next, John said the membership should support new missions for SRS. Benefits, which are a fiscal target nation-wide, would be a smaller portion of the Site budget if new missions are brought to the Site. He said that retirees should speak up for their legacy. All retirees contributed to SRS accomplishments Input from retirees at Citizens Advisory Board (CAB) meetings and hearings is essential so that CAB members hear a balanced viewpoint of site issues. Newcomers to the community do not understand what SRS missions or what retirees did or why it had to be done. He added that retirees should not allow those who are opposed to anything nuclear or the misinformed to tarnish the retirees' legacy.

He ended his presentation by stating the BOD members have worked very hard over the past year as retirees' advocates. They have exhibited the commitment and perseverance necessary to make a difference.

Presentation by Dr. David Moody, DOE-SR Manager

John introduced Dr. David Moody as the next speaker. Dr. Moody discussed the ongoing discussions among SRSRA representatives, SRNS management, and himself. He hopes that these discussions will continue after he retires. Although not all parties agree at these meetings, "our hearts are in the right place."

Dr. Moody discussed some of the SRS accomplishments including technological advancements and applications in service to the nation, standing as a core of our nuclear deterrent, and an unsurpassed safety record.

The budget for fiscal year 2015 is \$1,922 million with a workforce for the first quarter of 11,174. There are about 1,000 employees per year lost to attrition who are replaced with new employees. He expects the workforce to remain at around 11,000 for the next 10 years.

Dr. Moody said that DOE-SR management recognizes and responds to retiree interests. He provided examples, including the following:

- Medicare Supplement Availability: SRS retirees on average have 3.3 carriers and 36.5 options (Min: 2 carriers, 12 options).
- Medicare Advantage Availability: SRS retirees on average have 5.8 carriers and 23.2 options (Min: 2 carriers, 3 options).
- Claim Denials: Since January 2013, claim denials by WageWorks (WW) have steadily decreased (from 16.3 percent to 10.8 percent). Retirees can reduce denials by sending all receipts, fully completing claims forms and avoiding duplicate claim submissions
 - Result: WW denials are decreasing; SRNS/SRR will keep retirees informed on ways to reduce or eliminate claim denials.
- Considering the Pension Cost of Living Allowance request
- Changing the stipend: SRNS asked TowersWatson to perform market research to determine average stipend amounts (Lawrence Livermore and SRS are highest at \$2,400)
- Adding a prescription drug plan: TowersWatson is researching the prevalence and cost of adding this type of plan.
- Premiums for Pre-65 retirees: TowersWatson is calculating the premiums for Active and Pre-65 retirees. Preliminary rates are available in April with final rates available in May-June
- Alternatives to WageWorks: Improvements have been made to existing plan and additional areas for improvement continue to be evaluated
- Veterans with VA and TriCare benefits: TowersWatson is developing a cost analysis as well as the process for receiving a stipend without enrolling in a Medicare Supplement (MS) or Medicare Advantage (MA) plan
- Delayed enrollment or re-enrollment: Currently, the plan does not allow a retiree to waive enrollment or terminate enrollment in a MA or MS plan to re-enroll at a later time. MMA is looking at how processing such an enrollment change would happen
- Financial support for the Resource Center: SRNS made an initial donation to establish the Resource Center. Further funding opportunities will have to be evaluated as the current arrangement does not have an employer employee relationship with SRNS

As for the path forward, Dr. Moody noted the following:

- Continue quarterly meetings with SRSRA Executive Board and additional future "Town Hall" forums, as requested
- Continue accessibility to contractor benefits team for assistance, information

- Continue to solicit SRSRA input on opportunities for improvement to claims filing/reimbursements and other key interests (case-by-case basis)
- Help find workable solutions for challenges

Presentation by Rick Sprague, Senior Vice President for SRNS Technical Services

John introduced Rick Sprague, who provided an overview of SRNS. He provided an organization chart of the management team, discussed the interface management of SRS alignment with federal agencies and contractors, and noted accomplishments for Environmental Management, National Nuclear Security Administration, and the Savannah River National Laboratory.

Rick noted the support SRNS has provided to SRSRA and retirees, including the following:

- Handles daily calls from retirees about Pre-65 Health Care Plan and the Post-65 Vendors and Reimbursement Accounts (Plans)
- Serves as Liaison between BlueCross® BlueShield®, My Medicare Advocate®, WageWorks® and the retirees
- Developed a brochure for new retirees about the transition to retirement and Medicare
- Provide actuarial evaluations in support of ad hoc requests
- Respond to data requests regarding pension and other issues
- Coordinate, plan and communicate changes to the Plans

He also reviewed the SRNS support to the Resource Center:

- SRNS donated \$5,000 to the Resource Center
- Assisted with the planning and implementation
- Conducted training for the Resource Center Volunteers
- Coordinated the development of three YouTube® videos
- Developed and mailed an announcement regarding the opening
- Assigned a dedicated contact with My Medicare Advocate® to facilitate issue resolution for the Resource Center
- Ongoing response to inquiries

OUESTIONS

After the break, there was a question-and-answer session using questions collected from the audience.

GENERAL BUSINESS

After John Veldman returned to the agenda, Fred Cadek moved the 2014 Annual Meeting minutes be approved, as published in the last newsletter. There was a second and the motion approved.

Fred Cadek, Nomination Committee Chair, discussed the election of board members. Board members who were up for reelection were: Fred Cadek, Bruce Cadotte, Fred Cavanaugh, Bernice Deloach, Dave Fauth, Gail Jernigan, James Tisaranni, Thomas Varallo, and John Veldman. New proposed board members were: Jerry Evatt, Tom French, Deb Shedrow, Jann Smith, Ben Stewart and Victor Wright. A motion was made to elect the slate of board members as discussed by acclamation. There was a second and the motion approved.
