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CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

During the past three months we have had several meetings with both DOE and the "landlord" for our benefits, SRNS. Your benefits committee has been very active and persistent is bringing all issues to the table. I want to take this opportunity to thank and commend Jeff Allison, DOE SRS Operations Manager for his cooperation and patience in providing us time to air our concerns. We have many issues on the table that we will share with you as they are resolved. The most important accomplishments are 1) the open dialog we now enjoy with both DOE and SRNS, 2) the contractor and DOE now understand our position regarding many issues, 3) the most significant of which, to quote your Benefits Committee Chairman, "we as a group (SRS retirees) have 5 different retirement benefits packages from several early retirement and normal retirements, over 16 years or more, that the new Contractor, SRNS, views as a problem they must solve". It is a problem because all retirement benefits costs come off the top of SRS operating funds before any money is released for Site projects. What this means to you and me is that our retirement costs are debated in Congress each and every year as part of the DOE budget approval process. This a major concern because the basis and background for very significant benefits package costs to meet full pension fund obligations (\$311 million for SRS this year) are debated every year. We would prefer that all retirement benefits be a separate line item in the budget since those costs were approved by fiduciary action in Authorization Bills and funding approvals up to 16 years ago. You can imagine that this issue was discussed in detail in our meetings these past few months. We are satisfied that all parties now understand it, except for Congress. We plan to visit congress soon to make them aware of this and other issues. We are working to develop a solution for Congressional action.

I will close with a commendation to our BOD member Mayor Fred Cavanaugh who introduced your chairman at a DOE sponsored SRS Stakeholder breakfast on November 4. Fred was the Master of Ceremonies and introduced the guest of honor, Daniel Poneman, Deputy Secretary of Energy, and other special guests including Tom D'Agostino, Administrator, National Nuclear Security Administration and Ines Triay, Assistant Secretary for Environmental Management. Fred made his usual elegant introductions and then introduced your chairman while repeating the SRSRA mission statement. He added that we needed a pay raise. Now we are talking about a group including representatives from several of our Congressional Delegation, mayors and council members

representing all CSRA communities, the Press and many other community leaders. Thanks to Mayor Fred Cavanaugh, the SRSRA received the biggest boost ever.

Look for reports to follow on many issues currently on your BOD agenda. I will close with a plea <u>delegating</u> each and every one of you to find 2 retirees not currently in our dues paying organization and bring those folks onboard. We are currently over 1000 members and you our delegated ambassadors can easily justify the need to increase our numbers. We have 4,500 folks retired under our program, let's find them and sign them up.

SRNS Leadership Change

SRS NUCLEAR WEAPONS PATRIOTS NATIONAL DAY OF REMEMBRANCE

In commemoration of a National Day of Remembrance, the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) honored past, present and future nuclear weapons program employees of the Savannah River Site (SRS) at a special program attended by over 300 people on the morning of October 30 at SRS.

In its near 60-year existence, the Savannah River Site has served as a major cornerstone of America's national defense infrastructure. "Your work in support of nuclear security over these six decades has made important contributions to our national security. You helped end WWII, win the Cold War, and establish the United States as a leader in science, technology and engineering. The SRS workforce continues in that tradition by providing the tools to tackle many of the challenges we face today," said Jeffrey Allison, Manager, DOE Savannah River Operations addressing a large audience of SRS retirees and current employees.

As the names of over 103,000 past and present employees scrolled across a large screen, Mr. Allison acknowledged, "We recognize that the successes SRS has enjoyed for decades are due in large part to the efforts and achievements of its predecessors who chartered significant scientific breakthroughs in the name of national security. Today we celebrate your legacy of service and recognize your contributions to keep America safe."

The following Members of Congress provided letters of acknowledgement and appreciation that were read at the program: Senator Lindsey Graham (SC); Senator Jim DeMint (SC); Senator Saxby Chambliss (GA); Senator Johnny Isakson (GA); Congressman Joe Wilson (SC); Congressman John Spratt (SC); Congressman Gresham Barrett (SC); Congressman John Barrow (GA); and Congressman Paul Broun (GA). Remarks were also provided by guest speakers, Dave Cowfer, President, SRS Retirees Association and Mal McKibben, President, SRS Heritage Foundation, Inc. The SRSRA Board of Directors was well represented at the event.

At the conclusion of the program, a commemorative marker, paying tribute to the historic service of SRS patriots, was unveiled and will be permanently and prominently displayed at SRS. "This marker serves as a testament to the dedication and hard work of all SRS employees - past, present, and those to come - who make SRS a model of national commitment," Mr. Allison said. "Your service, sacrifice and patriotism are held in the highest regard."

On May 20, the United States Senate unanimously approved a resolution designating October 30, 2009, as a National Day of Remembrance for nuclear weapons program workers and uranium miners, millers and haulers. Earlier this month, the United States House of Representatives approved its own resolution, House Resolution 790, declaring October 30, 2009 as a National Day of Remembrance for nuclear workers to be recognized for their contribution, service, and sacrifice towards the defense of our great Nation.

This report covers the first three months of the 2009-2010 fiscal year.

All income during this period was from member dues payment. The major expenses were Director and Officer Liability insurance, deposit on the 2010 annual meeting facility, newsletter printing, and the website including host fees for the next two years.

SRSRA MEDICAL BENEFITS COMMITTEE

Medicare Part D, Retiree Drug Subsidy Issue

As discussed in the Chairman's Letter above, SRSRA has had several meetings with both SRNS and the DOE to discuss various issues related to Retiree benefits. One issue is the question of the accounting of Medicare Part D subsidy funds being paid to SRS contractors by the US Government under the Retiree Drug Subsidy (RDS) program. The funds received are in addition to normal reimbursements from the DOE.

As a result of an act of Congress, private sponsors may receive a cash subsidy for qualified prescription drug expenditures as long as the sponsor's private is plan is "on the average as good as the standard Medicare Part D coverage." The law stipulates that the subsidy is for the benefit of retirees that qualify for Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage. [The RDS statutory provisions are published at 42 U.S.C. 1395§-132 (Section 1860D-22 of the Social Security Act). The regulations are published at 42 CFR Part 423, Subpart R.]

The SRSRA has taken issue with the failure on the part of our Plan sponsors to show how the receipt of the Medicare subsidy has benefited retirees that qualify for the subsidy. We have been told that there is one common account used for the receipt and disbursements of funds used for prescription drugs and other Plan general health care expenditures. Contributions collected from retiree pension checks and funds collected from active workers are commingled indiscriminately within the commonly shared Medical Plan account. It is unclear as to why the Medicare subsidy is being used to benefit non-Medicare participants on a common basis. The SRSRA maintains that all Medicare subsidies should be used for the exclusively benefit of those retirees over 65 that are on Medicare.

The desired resolution of this issue is implementation of appropriate reductions in Health Choice costs, coinsurance and premiums, required of over those over age 65. The SRSRA supports full disclosure and accountability of how RDS funds are being spent. It is desired that reporting use of RDS reimbursements be sent to Plan participants on an annual basis.

In support of the above position is the recent announcement that eligible Oak Ridge retirees will receive reduced 2010 health plan contributions to reflect RDS reimbursements.

We will keep you posted on the progress of the resolution of this issue.

SRSRA MEDICAL INTERFACE COMMITTEE

Present Your Blue Cross/Blue Shield (BC/BS) Card when Filling Prescriptions

One of our retirees recently had some surgery and was prescribed medication for pain, antibiotics, and a tranquilizer. The retiree was not concerned about reporting the expense of the medications to BC/BS since they would not be reaching their deductible for the year. As a matter of routine the retiree gave the pharmacy their BC/BS card and was surprised when they were advised that the drug costs to BC/BS clients at participating pharmacies is considerably less than costs to uninsured customers for the same drugs. This is understandable since physician charges to BC/BS clients are negotiated and are considerably less than charges to uninsured patients. Make it a habit to present your insurance card to whatever pharmacy you use. It could save you some money.

SRS ACTIVITIES (INCLUDES DOE, SRNS AND SRR)

SRS Technology a Success – Five Billion Times

After nearly a quarter century, over five billion gallons of groundwater – enough to fill 7,575 Olympic sized swimming pools – has been successfully extracted and remediated from SRS' A and M Areas utilizing the M-1 Air Stripper, an environmental remediation technology which is still going strong.

Historically, these areas contained facilities that manufactured reactor fuel and target assemblies, and also provided support, administrative and laboratory services to SRS.

During manufacturing activities, which took place from the 1950s to the 1980s, a variety of industrial solvents were used to clean and degrease the various equipment and fuel components. These solvents were then discharged to the environment within the A and M Areas, a common practice during the time.

Following the installation of monitoring wells in 1985, it was discovered that the solvents had contaminated the groundwater. The primary contaminants detected were the solvents trichloroethylene (TCE) and tetrachloroethylene (PCE). These compounds are common in industrial sites across the country as well as dry cleaning establishments. Solvents were used in this area to remove grease and oils from metal components. TCE and PCE are Dense Non Aqueous Phase Liquids (DNAPLs), which means that they are heavier than water, an attribute which allows them to seep through the vadose zone and taint the underlying groundwater. The vadose zone is a porous area between the surface and the groundwater. The pores may be filled with water or air, acting as a natural filtration system.

Now, thanks to the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act (ARRA), SRS has been able to fully fund remedial projects like the M1 Air Stripper thus accelerating the cleanup and closure of numerous waste sites throughout the complex. Approximately \$750,000 of Recovery Act funding will be spent on this effort during the 30 month project at SRS.

SRS Continues Excellent Environmental Record

The Savannah River Site posted another excellent environmental record in 2008, as operations continued to result in minimal impact to the offsite public. Data on the site's record is contained in the SRS *Environmental Report for 2008*, which is available on www.srs.gov.

For 2008 the calculated radiation dose to an individual is 0.12 millirem, less than 0.2 percent of the 100-millirem-per-year U.S. Department of Energy exposure standard). By contrast, natural background radiation averages about 300 millirem per year to persons in the United States.

This measurement continues a 17-year trend in which in which potential exposure from overall site operations has been successfully kept to less than 0.3 percent of the federal standard.

The report includes other graphic information on historical trends in air and water monitoring, reflecting the continuing drop in releases as old facilities have been taken out of service, and newer, more modern operations have come on line.

SRNL, AUTOMAKERS TO DEVELOP HIGH-PERFORMANCE WIRELESS SENSOR NETWORKS

Several industries use wireless sensors, which can monitor chemical processes or equipment activity and then transmit the data over a wireless network. Still, many facilities that could benefit from the use of wireless sensors must continue to use a wired network instead, because the reliability, speed and security of the current generation of wireless sensors do not meet their needs. SRNL has entered into a cooperative research and development agreement with the United States Council for Automotive Research LLC (USCAR), the collaborative automotive technology organization for Chrysler Group LLC, Ford Motor Company and General Motors Corporation. The purpose of the collaboration is to develop a new platform for short range wireless sensors networks that meets the NNSA security and reliability requirements, and can also be adopted as the industry standard. Under the agreement, SRNL will develop designs and specifications for the new wireless hardware, then engage a qualified wireless manufacturer to make a prototype, which the partners will test and validate. The ultimate goal of the agreement is to produce a standard for wireless sensor platforms that can be adopted by the International Society of Automation, a global instrumentation, systems and automation standards body.

SRR Employees Record 1 Million Safe Work Hours

Employees of Savannah River Remediation (SRR), the liquid waste contractor at the Savannah River Site (SRS), have worked one million hours since the new contract started on July 1, 2009, without a lost day of work due to an injury.

The milestone was reached October 11 and continues a long tradition by liquid waste employees of working safe and being recognized nationally as one of the safest projects in the U.S. Department of Energy complex. To recognize their efforts publically, employees have initiated a program that links their safe-work record to the community. It's called the Zero Lost Time Injury Campaign. For every month employees work without an injury requiring days away from work, SRR will donate \$500 to a United Way agency or affiliated charity of the employees' choosing. Since beginning the campaign, three United Way agencies have been recipients of the \$500.

SRR recently received the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) Voluntary Protection Program (VPP) Star of Excellence award for exceptional safety performance. This was the seventh consecutive year SRS has received the award and is the highest safety award given by DOE.

BC/BS SERVICE CONCERNS

We receive letters from retirees trying to get proper Blue Cross/Blue Shield reimbursement for their medical bills. Most of the problems occur when the retiree/patient lives out-of-state (i.e., no longer in SC).
